



Points North and East For August 2015 by Jim Ogg

The wetter weather pattern of May continues with snow in Mammoth and the temporary closing of Tioga Pass for snow in July! With the wetter summer, the wildflowers and fall color may be closer to normal. August is the month for Alpine Wildflowers; the upper Steppe and Forest Wildflowers are usually past their peak however the Forest Wildflowers near treeline could persist. Dana Hanging Garden is usually sustained into August depending on the snowpack. The Forest Wildflowers in Coldwater Creek and Lundy Canyon also could be sustained into August.

I recommend trying Little Lakes Valley and visiting Minaret Vista at least for Alpine Wildflowers. Also trailheads at Tioga Pass, South Lake, North Lake, Coldwater Creek, Lake George, and Upper Virginia Lake provide day hiking access to Alpine Wildflowers. Sometimes the Alpine Wildflowers can be found in "Rock Gardens". And because they are above treeline they usually have dramatic backdrops. The trail to Ruby Lake and Mono Pass has several Rock Gardens.

Minaret Vista is above Mammoth Lakes Ski area at almost 10,000 feet. The Vista has a mix of Forest and Alpine Wildflowers in an above treeline setting. Walking along the San Joaquin Ridge will lead to more Alpine Wildflowers. And if adventurous and have 4WD capability, a 4WD road from Minaret Vista provides access to the San Joaquin Ridge Garden at over 10,500 feet. Mountain bikers and day hikers also use the 4WD road.

Since February the emphasis has been on the Wildflowers; six months of Spring!!! For most of August and until Fall Color in mid to late September, I visit the locations that are not as seasonal: The Bristlecone Pines in the White Mountains; Bodie Ghost Town; Tuolumne Meadows Domes; Tuolumne River and tributaries; Saddlebag Lakes Loop; and Great Sierra Silver Mine; and visit or participate in Outdoor Art Shows.

Also in August I visit the "Natural" features of the very active volcanic landscape that is the Eastern Sierra. Long Valley, at about 200 square miles, is one of the World's largest Calderas. It has several hundred springs and fumaroles and is seismically very active. Mammoth Lakes gets most of its electrical power from Geothermal sources in the Caldera. West of Horseshoe Lake in the Mammoth Lakes area, many acres of trees have been killed by carbon dioxide venting from the Caldera. South from Mono Lake, parallel with US395, is a chain of very recently active volcanoes. And at the Travertine Springs, the golden travertine mounds and rills form so fast that they appear to be almost alive as shown in the Sealth image, "Travertine Gold SR054"

The Bristlecone Pines favor Dolomite soils and the white Dolomite acts as a sun reflector, similar to snow, lighting the trees. Also I prefer Bodie in snow. I have been in Bodie twice with a fresh covering of snow blasting sun light into the sides of the Bodie structures like a giant reflector. Also I chase tarns and fungi. We think about the many lakes in the back country; however there are many more tarns. Tarns are small bodies of water that often dry up as the summer progresses. Sometimes they provide images that are unachievable with lakes because of their location, size, and many are unmapped and unvisited.

Travertine Gold (SR054)

The golden travertine mounds and rills form so fast that they appear to be almost alive.

The "Travertine Gold" image is part of the Sealth body of work which are digital images of landscapes, scenics, and the human form and are based on locations in the Travertine, Bridgeport Valley, Eastern Sierra, High Sierra and Central Coast of California.



San Luis Obispo Camera Club Cuba Exhibit

In February 2014 nine members of the San Luis Obispo Camera Club traveled to Cuba on a photography tour of Havana (some may have stayed on to travel further afield) with photographer Charles Anselmo. It is rare that so many people from one camera club go on a photo trip with Charles. The SLOCC members have put together an exhibit of their photos from that trip, which will be shown at the San Luis Obispo Museum of Art, commencing Friday, August 7, 2015. There will be an exhibition of prints displayed in the McMeen Gallery of the Museum. Howard Ignatius has also put together a slide show that will run continuously.

It is a good idea to support other camera clubs and attend events like this. However, that is not why I am writing about this exhibit. I have seen some of the photos taken by Howard Ignatius and Peggy Jannsen in Cuba. They are outstanding. Cheryl Strahl, another outstanding SLOCC photographer will also be exhibiting her photos from the trip. Our own Joseph Amanzio will have photos in the exhibit, and there will be some by photo tour leader, Charles Anselmo. I don't know any of the other participants, but suspect theirs will be of equal caliber. I think this promises to be a truly interesting high quality photo exhibit, worthy of attending on its own merits.

This exhibit is entirely separate and apart from and not to be confused with the Cuba Exhibit in San Mateo at the Avenue 25 Gallery that is open now and has been announced by Janice Darby by Email. That one is a mix of photos from participants on several different trips to Cuba with Charles Anselmo. Not too many of us can make it to San Mateo (It is about a 4 hour drive from Santa Maria).

A reception will take place at the Museum from 6:00 to 9:00 pm, Friday August 7, 2015. The exhibit will run from August 7 through August 30, 2015. Charles Anselmo will do a presentation on Saturday, August 8, 2015 at 2:00 pm on "Cuba, the social context and the photographic image." I don't know whether this will be similar or different from the presentation he did to the Santa Maria Camera Club earlier this year. I suspect it will be different, as he travels to Cuba every month but the hot summer months, and has already noticed significant changes as a result of the increased tourism that has occurred after the changes made, and in the making, by President Obama early this year.

The San Luis Obispo Museum of Art is located at 1010 Broad St. (on the west end of the Mission Plaza). The museum has a small front entry way on Broad St. between Higuera and Monterey, about a block up Broad toward the Mission from the Big Sky Cafe. There is parking a couple of blocks away in the parking structures on Palm St. If you can find street parking, it is free after 6:00 pm (they charge up to 6:00 pm in the SLO Core area on Sundays now.) The Museum is open from 11:00 am to 5:00 pm every day (through Labor Day). As the reception will take place after hours, the entrance to the museum will probably be through the back. There are two back entrances, one quite obvious and one sort of hidden close to the creek and accessible by a wooden deck. The latter was the one used for an after-hours photo event I attended last month.
