The exhibit is called "Where Land Meets Water" and will be on display through October 23, 2016.

It would expand our experience in competing. We might find that we are lacking or better than we thought, or both (in different ways).

SANTA MARIA CAMERA CLUB BOARD MEETING

June 20, 2016 at Merrill Gardens

Draft minutes prepared by Penni Powell (Janice Darby, Club Secretary, was unable to attend)

1. The meeting was called to order at 7:05pm. We have a quorum.
In attendance: Dave Clary, Flavio Parigi, Rosie Brancacio, Richard Russ, , Lynda Snodgrass, Ed Powell, and Penni Powell. Nyla James and Bob Ginn came in moments after the meeting started.
2. Recording the board meetings
Ed motioned, seconded by Lynda, that the board meetings be recorded starting with this meeting. A recording of the meetings can be of benefit in preparing the minutes but would not be used in lieu of the minutes. It could be used to clarify whether or not particular motions were made and what the results were of the voting. The motion passed.
3. Dave requested that the minutes from the May 30, 2016 board meeting be reviewed and approved, but a copy of the minutes wasn't available. This will be done at the next board meeting.
4. Dave questioned the board action regarding the Hidy Award on May 30, 2016, and the board decided to revisit it today. Ed motioned, seconded by Flavio, that the awarding of the Hidy Award be decided by the Club President, not by a committee. The motion passed.
Lynda motioned, seconded by Rosie, that the change will take place this year. The motion passed.
5. Treasurer's report (Dave got from Bill): 52 paid + 3 honorary members, bank balance of \$1,650.55.
6. Proposed amendment of the Constitution - Members At-Large
Dave motioned, seconded by Flavio, that the following section of the Constitution shall be amended as follows:
ARTICLE V – OFFICERS
CURRENT LANGUAGE TO BE DELETED:
“IN ADDITION UP TO SIX MEMBERS IN GOOD STANDING MAY BE APPOINTED BY THE EXISTING BOARD TO SERVE AS ACTIVE BOARD MEMBERS WITH FULL VOTING RIGHTS DURING BOARD MEETINGS.”
NEW LANGUAGE TO REPLACE DELETED LANGUAGE:
“IN ADDITION, MEMBERS IN GOOD STANDING WILL BE NOMINATED AND SIX WILL BE ELECTED CONCURRENTLY WITH THE OFFICERS OF THE CLUB. THOSE ELECTED WILL SERVE AS AT-LARGE MEMBERS OF THE BOARD. IF A LESSER NUMBER THAN SIX ARE WILLING TO SERVE, THOSE WHO ARE WILL BE NOMINATED AND IF ELECTED WILL CONSTITUTE THE AT-LARGE MEMBERS OF THE BOARD. THEY SHALL HAVE FULL VOTING RIGHTS DURING BOARD MEETINGS.”
The proposed change to the Constitution will be published in the Galleon prior to being voted on by the membership. The motion passed.
7. Bill Hood (presented by Dave as Bill is not present) proposed Patty Linane as a candidate for honorary membership to be considered by the executive board (Article 1 of the SMCC By-Laws). The executive board (President, Vice President, Treasurer and Secretary) will take it under consideration.
8. Club promotion at the Santa Barbara County Fair July 13-17, 2016
Dave motioned, seconded by Rosie, that the club produce a flyer/card at approximate cost of \$35 and set up a display about the club at the fair this year. The motion passed. A committee was formed and volunteers assigned duties to make this happen in a short time frame.
9. The move to adjourn was made by Ed, seconded by Richard, and the meeting was adjourned at 8:55pm.

Points North and East For August 2016 by Jim Ogg

El Nino continues to transition into La Nina June was the warmest ever on the Central Coast. And "Aussie Oaks" had less rainfall then last year! .. However the snowpack is still above normal for Central and Northern Sierra Nevada.

August is the month for Alpine Wildflowers; the upper Steppe and Forest Wildflowers are usually past their peak however the Forest Wildflowers near treeline could persist. Dana Hanging Garden is usually sustained into August depending on the snowpack. The Forest Wildflowers in Coldwater Creek and Lundy Canyon also could be sustained into August.

I recommend trying Little Lakes Valley for Alpine Wildflowers. Secret Lake **is one of** the lakes there. Sealth image "Secret Lake (SR063)" shows it. Little Lakes Valley in the John Muir Wilderness has about 40 lakes and tarns; some are next to the main trail and have many visitors while others are more remote hence less visited. However Secret Lake though sought by all is visited by only one.

I also recommend visiting Minaret Vista at least for Alpine Wildflowers. Also trailheads at Tioga Pass, South Lake, North Lake, Coldwater Creek, Lake George, and Upper Virginia Lake provide day hiking access to Alpine Wildflowers. Sometimes the Alpine Wildflowers can be found in "Rock Gardens". And because they are above treeline they usually have dramatic backdrops. The trail to Ruby Lake and Mono Pass has several Rock Gardens.

Minaret Vista is above Mammoth Lakes Ski area at almost 10,000 feet. The Vista has a mix of Forest and Alpine Wildflowers in an above treeline setting. Walking along the San Joaquin Ridge will lead to more Alpine Wildflowers. And if adventurous and have 4WD capability, a 4WD road from Minaret Vista

provides access to the San Joaquin Ridge Garden at over 10,500 feet. Mountain bikers and day hikers also use the 4WD road.

Since February the emphasis has been on the Wildflowers; six months of Spring!!! For most of August and until Fall Color in mid to late September, i visit the locations that are not as seasonal: The Bristlecone Pines in the White Mountains; Bodie Ghost Town; Tuolumne Meadows Domes; Tuolumne River and tributaries; Saddlebag Lakes Loop; and Great Sierra Silver Mine; and visit or participate in Outdoor Art Shows.

The Bristlecone Pines favor Dolomite soils and the white Dolomite acts as a sun reflector, similar to snow, lighting the trees. Also i prefer Bodie in snow. I have been in Bodie twice with a fresh covering of snow blasting sun light into the sides of the Bodie structures like a giant reflector.

Also i chase tarns and fungi. We think about the many lakes in the back country; however there are many more tarns. Tarns are small bodies of water that often dry up as the summer progresses. Sometimes they provide images that are unachievable with lakes because of their location, size, and many are unmapped and unvisited.

Fungi season in the Central Coast is winter however in the High Sierra it is summer. Finding an eight inch diameter "King Bolete" can be the highlight of any hike. Finding a field of "Chanterelles" is worth a song.
