

Program Meeting for May 1st

We were treated to quite a spectacular bloom of wildflowers this year. Hopefully many of you got out and enjoyed the show. The May Program Meeting will be a giant digital **Show & Tell**. Email Greg **greg.doudna@sbcglobal.net** up to 10 of your most interesting images of wildflowers, garden flowers, green grass, dramatic lighting, *etc*. It would be nice if your images were shot this year, and if not, be prepared to tell us when they were. It might be interesting to compare shots taken at the same location in different years.

Please follow the regular digital image submission rules in regard to size: santamariacameraclub.org/digprep.html.

You do not need to label your images any special way, or fill out an entry form. Prints are fine too; we don't have plans to set up the print display box, unless we have a lot of prints. Images can also be brought to the meeting on a flash drive. Be sure it's formatted for a PC! If submitting images on the day of the meeting, it's very important to arrive early, so we can start on-time and make things easy on Greg.

Points North and East For May 2019

As of late April, the rainfall continues to be much above normal at "Aussie Oaks" and the Superbloom happened. Even "Aussie Oaks" had extensive displays of Lupine, Clover and Lady Banks Roses..

Mammoth Lakes may have skiing until the Fourth of July! Mammoth Lakes usually is still winter when I arrive in April. The last weekend of April is the opening weekend for fishing. Often the high lakes are still frozen. In 2008, several fisherman fell through while ice fishing!! The lower portions of the Mammoth Mountain Ski area usually close near Easter weekend. The upper portions usually are open until at least Memorial Day weekend. And frequently until July 4th weekend. The wildflowers in Owens Valley and Upper Mojave usually peak in April. Virginia Lakes at 10,000 feet, Sabrina Lake, and Rock Creek Lake are usually accessible for the opening of fishing. The rest of the high country roads usually open during May or early June. The Tioga Pass lakes are usually accessible from the east by mid-May. The Yosemite National Park management can be anticipated to open Tioga Pass from its side for Memorial Day weekend.

The high country tarns and lakes usually have "ice breakup" during May; included Lakes Basin, South Lake, North Lake, Lake Sabrina, and Little Lakes Valley. As shown in the Sealth image, "Lake George Ice" (SR082), breakup is a most interesting time for High Sierra lakes. The highest easily reached lake of the Mammoth Lakes basin, Lake George has its own unique ice breakup features.

May begins what i call "magic time" in the Sierra. For May, June and July, the local noontime sun is very high in the sky. So polarizers work on the horizon for all directions not just in two as for sunrise and sunset. So i do much scenic midday shooting during these months; planning to be at the primary locations at local noon. This also provides the opportunity for fully lit landscapes. While those done at sunrise or sunset often have large, very dark areas.

The lower Steppe wildflowers of the Eastern Sierra usually peak during May. Areas to check out are Volcanic Tablelands, Fish Slough, Chalk Bluffs, Reversed Peak Tarns, and Oak Canyon near Independence. Also this is a good time to visit the Petroglyphs north of Bishop.

Desert Peach and Irises are the precursor flowers of the Eastern Sierra. Desert Peach is the first steppe shrub to bloom. The boring gray of the steppe "sagebrush" is overwhelmed by the pink-red masses of Desert Peach blossoms. And the Irises will fill meadows with masses of intense deep blue. The meadows of Bishop and Round Valley usually happen in mid to late May and those of Mono Lake, Bridgeport and Bodie happen in early to mid June.

Upper Mojave wildflowers are usually past their peak in May. But the spectacular Desert (Mariposa) Lily, if any, are usually found in May. However in 2008 they were early and peaked the last weekend of April. The display was prolific in the Haiwee area; comparable to the best ever year of 2005. Even past its peak, the Desert (Mariposa) Lily is certainly worth the search.

Lake George Ice (SR082)

The "Lake George Ice" image is part of the Sealth body of work which are digital images of landscapes, scenics, and the human form and are based on locations in the Lake George, Mammoth Lakes Basin, Mammoth Lakes, Eastern Sierra, High Sierra and Central Coast of California.

We'll meet at 5:30pm at Starbuck's in Nipomo (next to Miner's Ace Hardware, 581 West Tefft St.) for the drive to dinner in Paso, then head to Sensorio. Sensorio is East on Hwy 46 by Eberle Winery (4380 Highway 46 East, Paso Robles, CA). The best time to be there is right before sunset so we can see the lights come on as twilight fades...

I've verified with Sensorio that we can photograph there with our "professional" cameras as long as it's not for commercial use and we don't use tripods or block the walkways. The Field of Light is open until 11pm. Be sure to dress for night photography!
