CA 395 Field Trip Update ~ October 9-13, 2018

We have reduced the itinerary, eliminating all activities at Lone Pine.

On the 9th we will depart SM early morning, arriving Bishop/Big Pine early afternoon. Check into our hotel and then have an early dinner or purchase food to take with us to Bristlecone that late afternoon. We'd like to get early evening, sunset, and then night skies. We believe the monument is closed at 10PM. The drive to Bristlecone is about an hour and a half from Bishop. The elevation is 10,300' so you should prepare for temps below 32F after dark.

On the 10th we will relocate to Mammoth and stay there through the morning of the 13th. At this point the group will decide daily what the agenda will be. Fall Colors around some of the smaller lakes, drive up to Mono Lake for evening/night photography, drive up to Bodie Ghost Town. The weather and fall colors will influence our choices for the daily activities. Most activities will probably be early sunrise and sunsets, then nights.

Weather this time of year can be unpredictable. At the higher elevations it will clearly be cooler if not cold. Snow would provide excellent opportunities for photography. Scattered thunderstorms, clouds for great landscapes. We are not cancelling due to weather unless it's the apocalypse.

We would return home on Saturday morning the 13th. If Tioga Pass is still open, it would provide opportunities for high Sierra photos on the way home through Yosemite. If the pass is closed, we'll return south over Tehachapi Pass.

Hotel reservations, camping arrangements are up to each individual. There may be opportunities to carpool over. If you have any questions, call Greg at 805.406.8198.

Fall Color Weekend in the Western Sierras: Nevada City

October 19 - 22, 2018 (Fri-Mon)





WITH NEVADA CITY AS A BASE, visitors can view fall colors in historic towns and along the "roads less traveled" — Hwys. 49, 174 & 20. Nevada City was built in 1849 during the California Gold Rush. The downtown area is beautifully preserved with natural brick buildings, saloon-style bars, and cobblestone sidewalks.

In Nevada City, you'll also find trees the miners and their descendants planted - mostly sugar and red maples - growing as tall as 80 feet. "Most of the maples that you see here are native to the eastern forest," says UCCE master gardener Lynn Lorenson. For leaf peeping, locals and visitors alike gravitate to Nevada Street, where liquidambars and maples put on excellent displays year after year, showing their colors against a picture-perfect small-town backdrop of white church steeples, green lawns, and picket fences. The giant maples right next to the courthouse downtown can also be astonishingly beautiful.

Points North and East For September 2018

The good news is that by mid August, the Mosquitoes are usually past their peak. The bad news is so are the wildflowers, streams, snow pack, lake levels and meadows. In 2007 and 2008, the Sierra was very dry. Horseshoe Lake was nearly dry. By late August or early September Rabbitbush usually has turned. Some of the late Alpine and treeline wildflowers such as Blue Gentian, Alpine Gentian and Smooth Grasses of Parnasus are usually prominent late in August and may still be found in early September. And drought can cause Fall color to start earlier in September.

Early September brings the first frosts for the high country. And after Labor Day weekend, the eastern Sierra will have fewer visitors. Many consider early September as the best time to visit. As with August, I visit the locations that are not seasonal: The Bristlecone Pines in the White Mountains, Bodie Ghost Town, Tuolumne Meadows Domes, Tuolumne River and tributaries, Saddlebag Lake Loop, Mono Lake, South Tufa, Great Sierra Silver Mine, and the Labor Day Art Shows, rodeo and celebrations.

Alpine and treeline wildflowers are usually well past their peak, however some may persist. Late in August half of the more than two dozen varieties of wildflowers usually can still be found in bloom along Coldwater Creek. Besides Coldwater Creek, recommended are Lundy Canyon, Little Lakes Valley, and Minaret Vista. Trailheads at Tioga Pass, South Lake, North Lake, Emerald Lake, Lake George, and Upper Virginia Lake also provide day hiking access to wilderness areas and possibly some wildflowers. Also look for Rabbitbush. It sometimes forms billowing mounds of yellow-orange in the otherwise drab Great Basin Steppe areas, particularly at South Tufa, Mono Lake and Long Valley Caldera. The Sealth Image, "Travertine Paoha (SR114)", shows the Travertine Hot Springs.

The big attraction of September is "Fall Color!" The high country, 7,000 to 10,500 feet elevation, Aspen and Cottonwood Fall color usually peaks the last weekend of September through the first weekend of October. Earlier fall color indicates that the trees are stressed, usually by drought conditions.

The earliest Fall Color is usually found in locations between 9,000 and 10,500 feet; this includes Heart Lake in Little Lakes Valley, Glass Mountains, Sagehen Peak, and Dexter Canyon. Then look for Fall Color at Virginia Creek, Virginia Lakes, Conway Summit, and upper Bishop Creek. Afterwards the Fall Color peaks at Laurel Meadows, Hilton Creek, Tuff Campground, Lee Vining Creek, Summers Meadows, and South Bishop Creek Waterfall. The areas in the 4,000 - 7,000 feet elevation range usually peak in October but may be earlier this year.
